BUILDING SOLIDARTIY WITH INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY (In person)

This course will provide education to members of the PSAC on the history and struggles of Métis, Inuit and First Nations' people and peoples across Turtle Island. We will discuss the history and legacy of Residential Schools, Indian Hospitals, the *Indian Act*, colonialism, human rights, anti-racism, and oppression. We will examine the 94 Calls to Action and the 10 Principles of Reconciliation and discuss how they can apply to the work we do in the union.

Another main theme of the course is showing solidarity with FNMI communities. How we can do that as a union and how we can do that as individuals. Using little known but deeply important acts of solidarity, we can help members find creative and modern ways to help advance the issues of justice and human rights for FNMI members, their families and their communities. When we talk about Reconciliation, what we mean is reconciliACTION. And before any reconciliation there must be truth. When we learn the truth, it makes it abundantly easier for the union to walk the path of reconciliation. This course is a first step on that path.

This course was designed specifically for non-Indigenous members of the union; however, it is likely that a number of Indigenous members will register to participate. All are welcome in this course.

Prerequisites: There are no prerequisites for this course. This course is a prerequisite for Unionism on Turtle Island.

Eliminating and advocating to end violence against women has been a longstanding priority for PSAC members. Several resolutions on this issue have been adopted throughout the years. At the 2015 PSAC National Triennial Convention, members adopted a resolution to develop a domestic violence education training program. This course is a result of the action of members to bring this issue forward as a workplace and union issue.

If you are willing to take on advocacy and referral for members in the workplace who are experiencing domestic violence, we invite you to apply for this course. Participants will receive information and training on how to deliver short awareness presentations to other members on the topic of domestic violence in the workplace. There will be support worker(s) available throughout the course. By the end of this workshop participants will be able to:

- explain why domestic violence is a workplace issue and what the union can do to support members who experience domestic violence.
- identify the role and responsibilities of the parties with regards to supporting someone in the
- recognize the signs, in the workplace, that someone might be experiencing domestic violence.
- support and refer members who experience domestic violence.
- deliver a short awareness presentation to members, on domestic violence in the workplace.

DUTY TO ACCOMMODATE – An Evolving Discussion (Pan-Prairies Virtual)

Duty to Accommodate is a tri-partite system, which involves the worker, the union and the employer, with a focus on the duty of employers to make sure that their workplaces are inclusive and allow all workers to participate fully.

This course will frame the current process and explore how the Duty to Accommodate has recently evolved. The definition and understanding of accommodation needs is constantly evolving.

The process still places the onus on the employee to initiate the request – we will discuss how we change the employer's approach to accommodation, and how we can shift this process to one that is ingrained in the workplace culture, as opposed a system where we create exceptions to workplace expectations.
